This week as we enter our church we see an empty isolated silver tree, alone at the front looking sparce. Nothing special. Everything plain and simple. That's how it has been for as long as any of us can remember at Bethel.

An empty church and a simple bare silver tree.

Our church in its plain simplicity with the lone empty silver tree comes at a time as we start to think about Christmas.

We know Christmas started right back at the beginning of time but we generally start the Christmas celebrations with Mary. Mary a young girl, we assume. We do not know a lot about Mary at this point in time, but we do know that she was a "lowly servant", "humble" of "low estate" and a "handmaiden", all words she used to describe herself in verse 48. We assume she was alone as the angel appeared to her, there is no mention of anyone else present and we also know she was scared when the angel appeared "Mary was greatly troubled at his words".

There she was alone and vulnerable in front of an angel. However, in that moment, she was full of wonder and expectation. Then as the angel informed Mary of her part to play in the most amazing historical event this world would ever see she accepted willingly her role. A scared girl in front of an angel how could she do any thing else? If she had not chosen to accept what would have happened? Luckily Mary said yes.

In our church, with that empty silver tree, in that simplicity there is that feeling of expectation. For us it brings a hope for the future of our church with everyone bringing what they can reminding us of the widow as she gave all she had (Mark 12)

41 Jesus sat down opposite the place where the offerings were put and watched the crowd putting their money into the temple treasury. Many rich people threw in large amounts. 42 But a poor widow came and put in two very small copper coins, worth only a few pence.

43 Calling his disciples to him, Jesus said, 'Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the

others. 44 They all gave out of their wealth; but she, out of her poverty, put in everything — all she had to live on.'

Like Mary it is a time when we can say yes to what God is asking. We know this has been a strange year, and who knows next year may be as strange! But we can still have that hope in God, that expectation that he will continue to be with us as we enter into the Christmas season of 2020 and on into the new year.

Once Mary had accepted what was happening, she rejoiced with song. A song now known as the Magnificat



So as we bring our gifts, whether they are monetary, prayer, giving of time or self, whether they be sharing what we can, joining in where we are needed we ask that you help us to rejoice as we go into this very different Christmas season. If we do that we will see as we do each year our simple, bare tree fill with all our gifts, bringing joy and hope for our future.




### Let's pray.
